Community Updates 1 SBC Councillors Councillor Bathgate commented on the recent review of facilities used by LiveBorders. These included Jed Town Hall and Library. There was also a discussion on progress with Jed Swimming Pool following the Town Meeting. A special report on the building was due out soon. 2 Crailing A section of the wall which goes along the village road had collapsed. SBC are considering options for repair. JB had an e-mail of proposals from Stuart Moir, SBC Engineer. (Appendix 1) These included replacement with a wooden fence and partial restoration to half the original height. View from the village was that full restoration is required. CC to respond to Stuart Moir CR Crailing Rideout. Contact from the Callant's Club suggesting amendments to the format of the Crailing part of the Ride. (Appendix 2) Initial discussions with Crailing residents suggested that they preferred to Keep the format as close to previous years as possible. (Appendix 3) CR to contact Lindsay Wilson, Secretary CR 3. Eckford Surface water. Problems with water and drainage in village now fully resolved. CR had written to thank SBC CR engineers for their work Road surface at Grahamslaw. Some of the worst pot holes had been filled. However, the surface of the road remains very rough. There were areas where the edge of the road was badly worn and there were some quite dangerous troughs in places. JB agreed to raise this with JΒ the Council. Distillery. Good morning Cllr,

Although I haven't had these specific works 'priced' by a Contractor, I looked over previously submitted 'rates' from SBcContracts to get an idea of likely costs for the two options, these being roughly as follows:

- Take down of existing wall, dispose of arisings and erect a timber post and 4 rail fence: around £250/m.
- Take down and rebuild of the wall to full height: around £1,000/m. A re-built wall to lower level would incur 30 40% price reduction.

More than happy to discuss further.

Subject: Historic masonry boundary wall - Crailing Village

Good afternoon Cllrs,

I write regarding the historic freestanding masonry boundary wall within Crailing Village centre, which partially collapsed in early February – please see some photo's attached. This is a Council owned wall, with the land purchased to facilitate the building of the historic road improvement scheme....

We are now planning works to tidy up the collapsed area and remove the temporary barriers put in place for public safety. As part of these plans, we have undertaken an inspection of the remaining sections of wall and this has revealed some fairly serious defects in the form of cracking, leaning, bulging and pointing deterioration over a fair section of the walls length – essentially this length of wall has come to the end of its serviceable life as the defects seen are beyond simple repointing...

We are keen to address these issues at the same time as addressing the current collapsed area. With this in mind, we propose to take down the poorest condition length of wall (approx. 30m length as indicated in the below plan), locally grade off and tidy the disturbed ground before constructing a new timber boundary fence in its place. I feel that this option is pragmatic and best value given the walls current condition, the purpose it serves and the Councils current budget backdrop.

I am keen to share the details with yourselves before sharing with the Community Council and public alike, as I appreciate this will be a change in view for a few properties within the village centre. More than happy to hear any thoughts you might have on the matter before I share further.

We met back in October last year to discuss the creation of a local place plan for Crailing, Eckford and Nisbet, and at that point in time there was no financial support available. I have had confirmation that there will be additional funding available to support communities with their local place plans again this financial year, if you are still interested in producing a local place plan.

Some funding is available through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund to support local place plans. This fund can be used to bring a consultant onboard to help support the local place plan process. We have a <u>Place Making Support Framework</u> which consists of pre-vetted consultants available to support communities with their local place plans. If you are interested in bringing in additional support, information can be found on the page linked above - you would qualify for support through Lot 1.

I am still waiting for confirmation if there will be any budget in our Community Engagement fund allocated to support smaller place plan requests such as printing costs, and I will let you know ASAP on this one. There is potential to draw on the SPF for these requests if no allocation is given within the Community Engagement fund for place plans, but I will keep you updated (hoping to have confirmation end of next week).
